INTRODUCTION

As you might have noticed from the fine print on the front cover (Nick Harvill Libraries: West Hollywood; San Francisco; Bad Salzhausen; Springfield, Missouri), 2012 was a year in which NHL resembled not a library but a book mobile. By late 2011, I was already spending a majority of my time in the Bay Area as result of my partner's new job there. However, life was to become even more complicated than that. This past September, I accompanied my mother to a German spa,

where she was receiving medical treatment. Two weeks following our return, her prognosis worsened, and I shipped my books and office to the city in the Ozarks where my family resides, and where I will remain until the first of the year. [East Coast clients please note, ground-shipping times will be reduced by several days; Californians, my apologies...]

As you might imagine, family has been on my mind a lot lately, much more so than usual this time of year, when I am typically engrossed in assembling this catalogue. However, the two coalesce quite well. Henry Miller wrote in *The Books in My Life* (page 28) that it is neither the books man reads nor his experiences that matter the most. Rather, it is "what he puts into them of his own." In order to get the full value from both reading and living, it is necessary to understand that the two exist symbiotically, each informing the other.

My mother came of age in the Jacqueline Kennedy years of the early 1960s, a time of elegance, when perfectionism was supposed to appear effortless. Reading books from that era allowed me to recognize that about her. However, it is a two-way street. Knowing her enabled me to better appreciate those books. As to my father, I had never met anyone in my life even half as unique, and then Nancy Mitford introduced me to her own father via her delightful novel, *The Pursuit*



of Love (page 9). I credit Mitford for helping to realize how strange and dull it would be to have a conventional father. Of course, the books for which you feel a strong connection or a passion may not be mine. It is my hope, however, that you do find at least one or two within the pages of this catalogue.

To take this concept a step further, I thought it might be amusing to do a case study, involving how pleased it makes us when we connect with books. It is based upon an idea that my friend, the decorator Oliver Furth, conceived several years ago when he hosted a Los County Museum

of Art dinner honoring Rose Tarlow. He arranged for a vintage book to be placed at each seat as a party favor. Oliver and I spent hours reviewing the guests and their various interests in order to select the perfect book for each. It was a huge success. They were delighted Oliver had taken the time to be so thoughtful. Moreover, it proved to be a marvelous icebreaker as they compared books. My case study on the next page imagines an A-List dinner party, but it could just as easily be applied to a weekend house party or a cruise on a yacht.




Guest, Michelle Obama

The book for Mrs. Obama, a sitting first lady, must be above all else, respectful. *The White House Book of Etiquette* (page 14) is not only that, it is very rare. No other copies are for sale, and it is only in a few libraries across the country. It would make a welcome addition to the White House collection.







Guest, Anderson Cooper

Would the CNN anchor already own *Double Exposure* (page 34), the autobiography of his grandmother Gloria Vanderbilt (the elder)? Maybe. However, not the copy that is from the library of Andy Warhol. Moreover, what a conversation starter.



Guest, Anna Wintour

Fashion is too obvious. Why not a book about her other great passion, tennis? Not only does she play, but she is also a great fan of the professional circuit. A Midcentury book about Wimbledon, *The Centre Court Story* (page 36) is perfect for her.





Guest, Gwynteth Paltrow

The Oscar-winning actress has become a diet and exercise maven in recent years, publishing books on the subject. She would be enthralled with *Diet for Epicures* (page 13), a groundbreaking book from 1932 that married the principles of healthy eating with the pleasures of French cuisine.

Guest, Bill Clinton

There are two obvious books to avoid in regard to the superstar former president. *Leaves of Grass* (page 1) would be an awkward choice, and for the same reason, so would *Sex and the Office* (page 14). However, *The Story of the U.S. Cavalry* (page 20) is a great alternative. It is from the library of Mr. Clinton's political hero, John F. Kennedy.



Guest, Anthony Hopkins

What do you give a Shakespearean actor? Well, most books on the Bard would be too academic, too dry. They would not stir conversation at the dinner table. Not *Shakespeare's Bawdy*, (page 49) a glossary of the many sexual and scatological references to be found in the plays of Shakespeare.



Guest, Duchess of Cambridge

A simple but perfect combination. Who is photographed more in hats than Prince William's wife? This book, *Heads and Tales* (page 16), is by the English milliner who, though now obscure, was the royal favorite in the Midcentury.



Guest, Tina Brown

Tina Brown has been involved in media for many years. She surely has an extensive and well-used library. Finding a book to surprise her presents a challenge, but fortunately Scoop (page 9) is the clear choice. Evelyn Waugh calls the fictional newspaper in Scoop, his satirical masterpiece, the Daily Beast, which is also the name of Brown's online daily.

Gan, Stephen. Visionaire #18, Fashion Special, Louis Vuitton. Limited Edition of 2,500 copies; this copy is numbered 1823. 1996. Loose leaf sheets housed in deluxe monogrammed portfolio designed and produced specially for Visionaire by Louis Vuitton. Book is in very good condition—case has been opened to inspect items, but sheets remain sealed in their original wrapper.

This is the most coveted edition of the great über-fashion periodical *Visionaire*, with contributions by Helmut Lang, Nan Goldin, Terry Richardson, Commes Des Garçons, and over forty others. By the time of the launch party at Mr. Chow in New York, all 2,500 copies had sold out, and the price has steadily increased ever since. \$2,500.00

[Warmly Inscribed to Elsa Schiaparelli] Bemelmans, Ludwig. *To the One I Love Best. Episodes from the Life of Lady Mendl.* First Edition. 1955. Book and dust jacket are very good condition. Book is signed, "for Schiap, with love, Ludwig."

In this affectionate memoir, Bemelmans recalls his impressionable years, as an acolyte of Elsie de Wolfe during her Beverly Hills exile (she fled her beloved Villa Trianon during the Nazi occupation of France). Filled with a succession of *bon mots* from the world famous decorator, this book recounts her Los Angeles adventures, and how even at her advanced age of eighty she conquered Hollywood. Lady Mendl was not only in Schiaparelli's circle, but she famously wore her designs, making this a really great association copy. \$650.00






[From the Collection of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru] Signed Photograph, of Earl and Countess Mountbatten of Burma. Gelatin Silver Print. 11 x 8 7/8. Photograph is in its original frame. Photo is signed by both Mountbattens and dated 1948. It is in very good condition.

This item comes directly from the widow of Dharam Prakash Berry, an architect who conducted survey work on Teen Murti Bhavan, the official residence of Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, in the early 1960s. It was hanging on the wall of the palace when Berry expressed admiration for it. Nehru responded by presenting it to Berry as a gift. It is a remarkable provenance under any circumstance, but even more so, considering that the Mountbattens were the final Viceroy and Vicereine of India and close with the Prime Minister.

[Signed] Vidal, Gore. *Myra Breckinridge*. Second Printing. 1968. Book is in very good condition; dust jacket is in very good minus condition—jacket shows a crease to the front flap and fraying. It is signed "Gore Vidal" on the title page.

Over twenty years before Hollywood exhorted critics not to reveal the secret of *The Crying Game*, Gore Vidal and his publishers had great success with the same tactic on this iconic novel from the late 1960s. There was no press tour. There was not even an advance review for critics. The public smelled blood, and the lack of official publicity ensured there was great attention to this "underground" novel. In terms of popular culture, it stands alongside *Valley of the Dolls* and *Auntie Mame*, but is better written than either.

[Signed Presentation] Whitman, Walt. Leaves of Grass. Author's Edition. 1882. Hardcover in original green cloth, rebacked with original spine neatly laid down and retaining original endpapers. Now housed in custom clamshell box. Book is inscribed on the front free endpaper, "Dr. Benjamin from the author May 26, 1883."

Recipient added handwritten notation below the inscription, "I was then Walt's personal physician, D.B." There are perhaps only one hundred copies of this rare Author's Edition. It includes the "sexuality odes," which were omitted from most versions. This book was sold by Bauman Rare Books in the early 2000s, and a two-page description of the book on Bauman's letterhead is laid in.


[Signed Presentation to Kay Graham] Moates, Marianne M. A Bridge of Childhood, Truman Capote's Southern Years. First Edition. 1989. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition. Inscription reads, "For Kay Graham, Because I know how very special you were to Tru, Best wishes Marianne Moates." A promotional bookmark also signed by the author is laid in.

Written in close cooperation with Capote's first cousin, this book chronicles Truman's formative years in Monroeville, Alabama. This copy is unique, because it is signed to Kay Graham, the guest of honor at Capote's legendary Black & White Ball.

Post, Laurens Van Der. *The Lost World of the Kalahari*. First English Edition. 1958. Book and dust jacket are in very good condition.

This is the classic story of the Bushmen (the San) of South Africa that established Laurens Van Der Post one of the most respected travel writers of his era. It was based upon an expedition across the Kalahari that he made for a BBC documentary. It is as much spiritual journey as a physical one, and in spite of some recent questioning of a few details, it is a classic book of Africa.

[Signed, with Original Drawing] Beard, Peter. *The End of the Game*. Revised and Updated Edition. 1977. Softcover. Book is in very good condition, with minor fraying and slightly upturned corners. On the half title page, there is an original drawing by Beard depicting and elephant and an antelope, with Beard's fingerprints in blue ink. It is inscribed, "(dear) Kurt, warmest memories and regards, Peter (B.) May 12th '78."

Some authors are rather stingy and humorless when it comes to signing copies of their books. Peter Beard is our favorite exception to that rule. However, even for him, this is a superb example. The book is a later edition of Beard's classic work on Africa, originally published in 1965.





Beard, Peter. Longing for Darkness, Kamante's Tales. First Edition. 1975. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition—first few pages show foxing, and there is minor fraying to the jacket. The afterword is a handwritten facsimile by Jacqueline Onassis.

Kamante, the beloved major-domo of Isak Dinesen's early Twentieth Century coffee plantation, leapt across history, skipping two generations. He landed at Peter Beard's Hog Ranch. The two collaborated on this unique scrapbook-style book in which Kamante relates his version of the events in *Out of Africa*. It also includes his interpretations and watercolors of the fables told to him by Dinesen. Interspersed are photographs from the collections of Dinesen and Denys Finch-Hatton.



Johnson, Osa. *I Married Adventure, The Lives and Adventures of Martin and Osa Johnson*. First Edition. 1940. Book is in very good condition—a gorgeous copy. Covers show light wear and previous owner's bookplate is attached.

In the rare book market, a dust jacket constitutes up to ninety-nine percent of a book's value. There are just a few exceptions, and this book is one of them. Design enthusiasts, who adore the zebra-patterned boards, gleefully snap up every available copy, dust jacket or not, and will happily remove the jacket if it happens to come with one. Book is the autobiography of a woman from Kansas who, like Dorothy, landed in Oz (in her case, sub-Saharan Africa).

Wilson, James C. *Three-Wheeling Through Africa*. Sixth Printing. 1939. Book and dust jacket are in very good condition—minor tears and fraying to jacket.

It is one thing to painstakingly organize an expedition that everyone says cannot be done. It is quite another to attempt it on the fly. However, that is what makes this book so interesting. It is the story of two American college students who landed in West Africa by frigate and instead of returning straightaway to the United States, decided to instead travel nearly four thousand miles, across the Sahara Desert, to the Red Sea. Quite by accident, they succeed. This book is their improbable story.


Huxley, Elspeth. *Murder on Safari*. Fifth Edition. 1938. Book is in very good minus condition; dust jacket is in good plus condition—endpapers are discolored, and jacket shows light fraying, particularly to the spine ends.

Like Karen Blixen, Elspeth Huxley (cousin by marriage to Aldous Huxley) lived on a coffee plantation in Africa. She wrote plenty of introspective, serious books on the Dark Continent, but this mystery, in marvelous period jacket, was quite well received. It is an offshoot of the English drawing room variety of mystery, with the action occurring in tents rather than in a country house.





Amaya, Mario. *Pop Art... And After, A Survey of he New Super-Realism.* First Edition. 1965. Book is in very good condition; dust jacket is in very good minus condition—jacket shows minor fraying to the edges.

As this book states, Pop Art was given a negative prognosis by most critics when it debuted in the early 1960s. They gave it only months to live. As the current hammer prices for Warhol paintings attest, *most critics* were wrong. This gorgeous book is equally durable. Though Pop Art ushered in the new, the production quality of this book harkens back to the 1930s, with gorgeous color plates and heavy paper stock. A gem. \$75.00

Greenaway, Peter. 100 Allegories to Represent the World. First Edition. 1998. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition. Text in English and French.

This is an art collage project from the British film director whose most famous feature was *The Cook, The Thief, His Wife, and Her Lover*. In fact, that movie, with Gilbert and George thrown in for good measure, offers some idea of what to expect from this book, in which Greenway creates elaborate collages from one hundred photographs of nudes. The themes of the pieces are allegories from the classical world and also the modern era. \$100.00





Smith, Patrick F. Warhol, *Conversations About the Artist*. First Edition. 1988. Book and dust jacket are in very good condition—previous owner's name and a price are written in pen on the flyleaf.

The title is apt. This is a book about Andy Warhol as a serious artist, not as the impresario of popular culture, which is more or less the theme of another Warhol book in this catalogue, *Andy Warhol's Exposures*. The author witnessed for himself the distinct differences between the public and private versions of Andy Warhol. He used the perspective when conducting over one hundred extensive interviews with Warhol friends, art dealers, and associates, which are excerpted in this book.

Varnedoe, Kirk. *High & Low, Modern Art and Popular Culture*. First Edition. 1990. Softcover. Book is in very good condition—there is a trace of fraying to the edges. Co-written with Adam Gopnik.

This was the book for a landmark exhibition at the Museum of Modern Art, which sought to liberate modern art from "a thorny crown of ideas" and incorporate it into the material world. Filled with images and examples, it is a dialogue between the high art of Picasso and Seurat and the low art of everyday living. It was written by one of the late Twentieth Century art world's most influential members, Kirk Varnedoe, was then MOMA's curator for paintings and sculpture.

Schjeldahl, Peter (essay). *Edward Ruscha Stains 1971 to 1975*. First Edition. 1992. Book and dust jacket are in very good condition.

In this attractive book of thirty-one full page "word picture" silkscreens executed by Ed Ruscha, many of the various media could, interestingly enough, also be used for baking—egg yolks, blueberries, cherries, beet juice. A word or phrase is etched into each. In Peter Schjeldahl's introductory essay, he explains that the juxtaposition of image with word is so effective, because "it is like hitting a rock in the road," because "no one can read and look simultaneously," causing the brain to work overtime to configure a different consciousness for each. \$250.00

Lieberman, William S. *The Nelson A. Rockefeller Collection of Modern Art.* First Edition. 1978. Introduction by Nelson A. Rockefeller. Photographs by Lee Boltin. Lavishly illustrated book on this extraordinary collection. The photograph on the dust jacket alone contains three Matisses. **Liberman, Alexander.** *The Artist in His Studio.* Revised Edition. 1978. This copy is from the library of Anne Ford, with a third party gift inscription to her. Image-filled profile of artists and their working spaces, written and photographed by the legendary Condé Nast editorial director.

[Signed] Thompson, Kay. *Eloise at Christmastime*. First Edition. 1958. Book is signed "Kay Thompson and ME ELOISE" in red ink on the flyleaf. Drawings by Hilary Knight. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition—jacket shows minor fraying to the edges.

Kay Thompson was an enormously talented singer and vocal coach, who mentored Frank Sinatra, Lena Horne, and Liza Minnelli. She also upstaged Audrey Hepburn in *Funny Face*, playing a Diana Vreeland-inspired fashion editor. Yet, she will be most remembered as the creator of Eloise. Not so happy with that, she took this and two other Eloise books out of print in the early 1960s and they remained so until her death in the late 1990s. As such, first editions of *Eloise at Christmastime* are difficult to find, and copies signed by her, even more so.

Nixon, Barbara. Jinnifer of London. First Edition. Book and dust jacket are both in good plus condition.

This uncommon book published only in the U.K. concerns a young cat so agile that she fancies herself a ballerina. She must come to the rescue of her more hapless brother. His weight problem has led to his capture by a gardener, and it is up to Jinnifer to plot his release. Along the way, she interacts with a variety of felines so idiosyncratic that they seemed to have just walked out of T.S. Eliot's famous poem. With b & w and color illustration.







Jackson, George Gibbard. *My Travel Book by Land, Sea and Air*. First Edition. Undated, but circa 1920. Book is in good plus condition—fraying to the covers and minor foxing to a few pages.

Illustrated with eight full-page color plates and many b & w drawings, this attractive book is geared towards adolescents, but now, is perhaps of just as much appeal to adults, particularly those interested in the golden age of travel. It was only published in Britain, and as such, is told from that perspective. Includes chapters on the great passenger railways, luxury steam liners, and much more.

Washburne, Heluiz. Little Elephant Catches Cold. Sixth Printing. 1945. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition. Illustrations by Jean McConnell.

First published in 1937, the charming characters in the "Little Elephant" series are a young elephant and his family who, though pachyderms, live as humans. The stories are sweet and funny, as Little Elephant gets into the same mishaps that might befall a human boy, age seven or eight. The illustrations, washes in color, are what make the books so extraordinary. They are marvelous and the reproduction quality is in full early Twentieth Century splendor. In this book, Little Elephant goes out in the rain without his rain gear and develops a cold. \$150.00





Washburne, Heluiz. *Little Elephant's Christmas*. Fourth Printing. 1944. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition. Illustrations by Jean McConnell.

This book features all of the experiences once associates with Christmas, but starring a mischievous elephant calf. In this installment, Little Elephant tries on a trunk warmer, retrieves a stocking from the fireplace, and eats a holiday feast. 


Dennys, Joyce. A Winter Sports Alphabet. First Edition. 1926. Hardcover with pictorial boards. Book is in good plus condition—there are some minor scratches and scuffmarks, with light foxing to the pages. Verses by Evoe. Need a hostess gift as thank you for an Alpine vacation? This divine book is perfect. The subject is the pleasures of winter, and the book contains twenty-six full page plates illustrated in the style as the image on the front cover—one for each letter of the alphabet. Also includes light verse and other interior illustrations.

Agnelli, Giovanni (preface). Sestrière, From Its Origins to the Fifties. First Edition. 1996. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition.

One expects James Bond to come skiing off the page in this glamorous and stylish book on the Torino, Italy ski resort. Coffee table size, it is mostly images. There are many vintage b & w photographs of both the resort and some jet setting patrons (well, pre-jet set actually). There are also colorful illustrations (most taken from midcentury advertising campaigns). Published in small quantity, it is already impossible to find copies. \$175.00





[Cecil Aldin Illustration] Irving, Washington. *An Old Fashioned Christmas Day*. First English Edition. 1908. Hardcover in beige boards and full-color pictorial pastedown front cover. Book is in good condition—endpapers are discolored, and there are taped repairs to perimeter of the back cover and spine.

Published in the United States as *An Old English Christmas*, this novelette by the great Nineteenth Century American writer was, in part, inspired by Charles Dickens's *A Christmas Carol*. It takes place entirely on the holiday in a story incorporating all of the great English Yuletide traditions. This U.K. edition was the only one to include illustrations by Cecil Aldin, the foremost painter of animals, particularly dogs, in early Twentieth Century Britain. Includes six marvelous tipped-in color plates. Uncommon.



SNOW SKIING, PAIR. Would be quite decorative casually arranged in a ski home in Aspen or Jackson Hole. Jacket to Jerome is only good, with a 2-inch chip to the lower spine and creasing to the front cover.

Bedel, Maurice. *Jerome, or The Latitude of Love.* Third Printing. 1928. In spite of the divine dust jacket illustration, snow skiing is tangential to the plot of this Goncourt Prize-winning novel, originally published in France. Bemelmans, Ludwig. *The High World.* First Edition. 1954. Charming story from Bemelmans in which a simple Tyrolean family must adapt to modernity.

[Everett Shinn, Illustrator] Dickens, Charles. *A Christmas Carol*. First Edition Thus. 1938. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition.

The plot of Dickens' classic tale is well known. What sets this edition apart is that it was the first with illustrations by Everett Shinn of the Ashcan School (who was also known for the Rococo Rival murals he painted for Elsie de Wolfe and Stanford White). There are both color and b & w images throughout—with a production quality not often seen today.

White, Gleeson. Christmas Cards & Their Chief Designers. Christmas Issue of the Studio Monthly. 1894. Hardcover with pictorial covers in very good condition, with just minor fraying.

This large format but slender book was the 1894 Christmas issue of the Victorian arts magazine, The Studio. It depicts various Christmas scenes of the period, some now quintessential and others since forgotten. There are Victorian women surrounded by cherubs, winter scenes, Dickens-inspired couples, and a few depictions of the nativity. Uncommon, particularly in such pristine condition.



This copy is ex libris the film director George Cukor, with his famous Paul Landacre-designed bookplate. Laid in is an original Cukor Christmas card from 1961, which is in the form of a bookmark, with a greeting on one side and silhouette portraits of Cukor's dogs on the other.

We now know plants cultivate us as much as we do them. Is it possible dogs have done likewise? The answer seems to be in the affirmative according to this the coffee table-style tribute. It is a compendium on all matters canine, with text, photographs, and other illustration.



Papashvily, George and Helen. *Dogs and People*. First Edition. 1954. Book and dust jacket are both in very good condition—just minor fraying to the spine ends. Drawings by Marguerite Kirmse.

Anyone who knows much about children will tell you that they do not like being patronized. This attractive book makes the same case for dogs. It is a modern approach but one that does not ignore science or tradition. The authors, a married couple, pivot between history, psychology, and their own experiences. The result is an intelligent and engaging book, told with humor and kindness but without sentimentality, perfect for experienced dog owners and novices alike.


Emanuel, Walter. *The Snob, Some Episodes in a Mis-spent Youth.* First English Edition. 1904. Book is a hardcover in pictorial boards. Covers are in very good minus condition—they show minor fraying and are slightly bowed. Written by a transplant to Honolulu who came of age beneath the grey skies of the North, she extols the pleasures of the Polynesian lifestyle, certain that the grass is actually greener (and the skies brighter). Includes recipes and the cultural information necessary to host a luau wherever one happens to reside.



Bierce was a contemporary of Mark Twain, and his work resembled Twain's, if perhaps filtered through Edgar Allan Poe. Through sardonic interpretations of even the most innocuous of words, Bierce savagely but hilariously exposes the dark side of society and its conventions. The book earned him the nickname "Bitter Bierce" but also lasting acclaim. Less than a decade after *The Devil's Dictionary*, Ambrose Bierce mysteriously disappeared in Mexico while covering the Mexican Revolution and was never heard from again. This edition includes eight hundred newly discovered definitions.
